The journal takes article contributions of up to 1,500-2,000, and features/news stories, etc. of up to 500 words on subjects directly related to the history and heritage of the East Midlands. If the material has been published elsewhere previously please let us know so that acknowledgments can be made.

Contributors are required to submit copy in electronic form, preferably Microsoft Word. Spelling should be checked through its English (UK) facility.

The inclusion of illustrations, photographs, prints, drawings, etc. is actively encouraged, but it is the author's responsibility, where required, to obtain permissions in writing to reproduce in both electronic and print format, and for the payment of any associated fees. Please provide high resolution images as separate graphic files: do not embed them in a Word document. Acceptable file formats are TIFF and JPEG at a resolution of no less than 300 dots per inch (120 dots per cm). Line work (e.g. graphs and maps) should be at a resolution of 1200 dots per inch (480 dots per cm) if possible. Indicate any acknowledgements (e.g. source or ownership) that need to be included.

The journal does not allow footnote references for its submissions, although it is happy to list briefly textual notes at the end of each submission as either 'References' or 'Further Reading'. If you wish to do this, then please follow the format below:
